Immigration Legal Clinic

The immigration legal consultation program has started and IOSC has been able to help many families and individuals who would otherwise not have had the opportunity to find out what legal options were available. Some clients found out what steps they can take

right now in the immigration process for themselves or their family members, and others found out why their cases were still processing and what were the next steps. At this time, it is difficult to obtain an immigration consultation in Baltimore without having to wait for an appointment, so the Wednesday walkin clinic has been a great help to our clients. Please note that there will not be any consultations on January 12th and February 23rd.

The Legal Clinic will be held on Wednesdays in the IOSC office on a first come-first serve basis. We ask that those attending the Legal Clinic arrive between 9:30 am to 10:30 am. Mindful Tutoring

As the IOSC is nearing the two-year anniversary of its online tutoring program, some of you already know that I have been quick to say that this is not what I signed up for. I am not particularly strong in the area of technology and I have frequently found myself asking what I have to offer through this venue -- especially when I am paired with a student who appears to be functioning above grade-level in math and reading. My student is now a first-grader and also has no major school projects or homework assignments to work on.

It recently occurred to me that maybe I could apply some of what I've been learning in the area of mindfulness to our tutoring sessions. If I saw our weekly meetings as opportunities to practice being in the moment, investigating topics using as many of our senses as possible, just being curious together without too much emphasis on accomplishing an outcome -- could something come of this? I am happy to say that to date we've both gained a lot from our sessions together using this approach.

Thanks to the "ABC Mouse" online program we have engaged in many enrichment activities, not traditional tutoring per se, that have taken us from our side of the world to the sled dogs of Alaska, Hawaiin volcanoes and the far reaches of the solar system. In the process, my student and I have developed a relationship that has fostered increased participation and self-confidence on her part. She asks and answers more questions than she used to and is comfortable offering her opinion at times. I hope that she sees herself as a unique individual with many strengths, besides being a rather quiet middle child in a large immigrant family.

I have certainly made gains myself also, in my quest to remain a life-long learner. In retrospect, I probably would not have signed up to do online tutoring, if not for the current national health crisis, but I'm glad that I did. *Mindfully submitted, Kathy Nichols, Tutor*

English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL)

In August, Cynthia asked if I was interested in tutoring someone in English and I met H for the first time at a picnic table outside the rectory. I'm retired and thought one of the ways I could make a contribution was to tutor someone in English. We've met weekly at the rectory until recently when we moved our sessions to the Towson library, so H doesn't need to use her car.

I'd taken a course years ago in teaching ESL but remembered little. Cynthia gave me a book – but it was geared to teaching groups of students. In the past five months, H and I have developed an effective format for our weekly two-hour sessions. We talk, and I can correct pronunciation and use of words. Using a Pre-GED manual I had, she <u>reads</u> and answers questions about the content, and we review definitions of words she did not know. Her skills are good in speaking and reading. Several times she has brought something to our sessions that she has <u>written</u> – that is where she has the greatest opportunity for improvement, and we plan to do more of this. Writing is a more difficult skill to self-learn. Her classroom learning of English was years ago, in Morocco, and, I think, her reading and speaking skills are largely self-taught in her time living and working in this country. I'm reviewing grammar books trying to find a good approach to verb tenses and other grammar issues and we will add grammar to our weekly format.

I enjoy our sessions and expect them to continue for quite a while. I highly recommend ESL tutoring to others who are retired and looking for a way to contribute. *Ruth Crystal, ESOL Instructor*

Computer Literacy

Seven students recently completed the beginner Computer Literacy class held this fall. The 10-week course is conducted largely online via Zoom and is taught by Fred Trenkle and Véronique Ayivi-Blibo. The students learn how to use software applications such as Google Docs (which is similar to Microsoft Word), Gmail, Google Drive and Google Calendar, in addition to some real-world technical skills such as how to search for information online, how to find and apply for a job and how to compose a resume using word processing software. Students are supplied with a Chromebook for the class and, provided that they attend class and complete homework assignments, they are able to keep their machine to use as their home computer.
